

Summary:

Using easy-to-construct and easy-to-carry metal frame shelters adapted from previous Sri Lanka programmes, the implementing organisation was able to support affected families on in 27 different villages along the coastline. The project avoided the creation of large camps, instead focusing on helping people to build customary plots of land, whither belonging to themselves or negotiated from land owners.
